Dollars for Scholars

On a lovely fifth day of May, the UCSC Women's Club awarded \$20,000 in scholarships to 23 re-entry students. This was a new record in both the number of recipients and in the amount of the awards. Twelve scholarships went to women and eleven to men in a variety of disciplines and including both undergraduate and graduate students. Seventeen of the twenty-three scholars attended this event and several gave public expressions of appreciation along with explanations of their course of study or research project.

The campus received a record number of financial aid applications this year, clearly reflective of the economic climate. More students are struggling to fund the cost of their education, and it's vital that groups like the UCSC Women's Club provide financial support to deserving students. In applying, all students demonstrated both financial need and strong academic standing. Many students are single parents and/or the first in their family to attend college; others have families to support while putting themselves through school.

In presenting the awards, Mary Wells, Scholarship Coordinator for the UCSC Women's Club said, "I'm grateful that our Club was able to make awards to so many talented and deserving students. All are heroes in my book, overcoming any number of obstacles and barriers through hard work and sacrifice in the short term in order that they may follow a passion or dream not only to better themselves but to make the world a better place in some way."

Thanks to the program organizers who made this annual event a success, and to Fiat Musica, who performed yet another superb slate of melodic selections.

English in Action! Would you like to meet people from other countries? English in Action volunteers help UCSC foreign students practice English and learn more about life in the U.S. In turn, volunteers learn about life and culture in foreign countries through the eyes of natives.

The program consists of informal, non-structured meetings which give the foreign scholar, student or spouse an opportunity to practice conversational English. Usually the meetings are once a week for an hour or so, but the time, location and number of meetings depends on what works for the student and the volunteer. It is not a class but a one-on-one conversation.

Marilyn Potash was introduced to Yoon Ah Kang, an exchange student from Korea, through the program in February of this year. Yoon Ah usually takes the bus downtown to meet Marilyn for coffee or lunch. Yoon Ah is studying Health Sciences and Marilyn is a former health care professional, so they often discuss health care issues. "We also talk about the differences in our cultures and family life," says Marilyn.

Proposed Membership Dues Changes for 2011-2012

The Executive Board and other members of the UCSC Women's Club work hard to keep the organization flourishing and moving forward without placing undue financial burden on Club members. Recently, we have gone greener and leaner, changing to electronic versions of the membership letter and the newsletter, thereby saving paper and postage costs, and we are producing the newsletter in-house, saving on printing expenses. In addition, we bring in other revenue to offset our operating costs and, of course, enrich our scholarship funding, via many fund-raising activities.

As of July 2010, the University began charging us a fee of 6 percent on all monies contributed to the Club. This includes donations, proceeds from our fundraising events, and even the membership dues that you pay. After much discussion around the board table, it is with regret that we must now request a modest increase in the dues for next year (2011–2012). The proposed new fee structure will be: \$40 Regular, \$30 Seniors, and \$15 for Students.

We will be asking for your endorsement of this increase at our upcoming October 6 Fall Gathering. We hope you will support this decision to ensure the continuation of our valuable efforts: the UCSC Women's Club and all of the good work that we do in our community.

Our **November 3** meeting, also at the Arboretum, will feature **Doreen Dawson**, who is the Santa Cruz Regional Coordinator for iSanctuary, a non-profit dedicated to disrupting the human trafficking in Mumbai. This non-profit group was founded by two Southern California women who were moved to action against this shocking practice. The goal of the organization is to open safe schools in India where women can receive shelter and learn self-sufficiency skills. Some of the rescued women make jewelry to help support themselves. Norrie's Gift Shop at the Arboretum carries some of this unique ware; those attending the meeting on the 3rd will receive a discount for that day on their jewelry purchases.

Michael Fields, Ph.D. is with the United States Geologic Survey, working out of UCSC's Seymour Marine Lab, researching life in our oceans. The impact of pollution on coral reefs worldwide is the focus of his work. His studies reveal how reefs are a barometer for change in the ocean. His perspective encompasses millions of years of geological history, including the impact of pollution and climate change. These and other challenges to the health of the natural world will be highlighted in his talk at the Club's Wednesday, **February 2** meeting.
