Remembering Mrs. Pister

When Karl and Rita Pister first came to campus to assume leadership in 1991, a friend of mine who worked in the chancellor's office assured me that I would really like them. She said they were wonderful people and true partners in every sense. My friend knew I had a sincere interest in knowing if our new "first lady" would continue the long tradition of opening her home, University House, to the UCSC Women's Club. Would she be supportive of our efforts to support the campus and its re-entry students?

Meeting Mrs. Pister for the first time, I was thrilled. She seemed delighted to have found a ready-made group of friends who were eager to include and welcome her, and she wanted to know all about us.

Monthly meetings from fall to spring were wonderful with her as our hostess. Rita graciously greeted us as we arrived at the University House front door and helped those of us bringing food to find a place for our platters on the dining room table. After the meetings, she would often engage those of us who lingered to help clean up in discussions about what we learned from the faculty lecture that day which enriched our experience.

The December meetings were especially memorable. A devout Catholic herself, Rita was very interested in others' faiths and she would ask people to share their holiday traditions. Over a sumptuous luncheon, we would learn about Deepavali and Chanukah, the Indian and Jewish Festivals of Light, and then she would charm us with her own memories of Christmas and how she taught her children about the meaning of their faith. After lunch and stories, we would gather around the piano and sing Christmas carols and other songs of the winter season from different cultures.

The club dreamed about establishing an endowment and was putting aside \$1,000 a year from our fundraising efforts, aiming for \$10,000 in ten years. When Rita learned about this, I remember her exact words to me: "We have to reach that goal much sooner so it can start making money for our scholarships." Shortly thereafter, she told me she was going to host an art auction of faculty, staff, student and alumni-donated work and wanted me to co-chair the committee with her. She had already enlisted Art Board Chair Joyce Brodsky and many other wonderful club members. Larry Wolfson volunteered to be the auctioneer. The committee worked for weeks organizing both a live and silent "Gala Art Auction" that debuted one evening at University House. In the end, we raised more than \$3,500 that first year, which almost doubled our fund. The second year auction was even more successful and enabled us to reach our goal. *(Continued on next page.)*

When Chancellor and Mrs. Pister retired, the board decided to name the endowment after Rita in honor of her dedication to the club and the campus, but most of all because of her commitment to supporting the dreams of re-entry students striving to achieve their educational goals. I was president of the club at this time and it was my privilege to give an address at our Spring Luncheon where we surprised her with the endowment-naming. I spoke about how, in addition to being Karl's wife and Chancellor's Associate, Rita was an artist, scholar, philosopher, philanthropist, wife, mother, grandma and friend. (I still have my notes.)

It was a joyful, and tearful, day for many of us as we expressed the love and appreciation we felt for her. Underlying the celebration, many of us also felt a keen sense of impending loss. A golden era for our club and the campus was coming to an end, and we were saying goodbye to a dear friend who would be deeply missed on our campus.

Our fundraising totaled \$402.23.

Scholarships

One of the primary goals of the UCSC Women's Club is to provide educational opportunities for UCSC re-entry students through scholarships and academic support. Garden tours, phantom tea parties, art and silent auctions, chocolate festivals, membership dues and individual donations are some of the ways funds have been raised over the years. Through these efforts, the Women's Club has been able to assist older students for whom studies in their chosen field may be an otherwise unattainable dream. Over the past thirty years, the Club has awarded 316 scholarships for a total of \$198,242 for research activities, tuition, and childcare.

Scholarship monies given to students come from two sources: money raised directly to be awarded for scholarships and money that is interest income from our endowment. While we continue to raise money for both direct scholarships and to invest into the endowment, our current effort is to increase the endowment to ensure our scholarship program for future generations.

The endowment was named for Rita Olsen Pister, longtime Women's Club member and wife of Chancellor Emeritus Karl S. Pister whose tenure ran from 1991 to 1996. Rita took her role as Associate to the Chancellor seriously as she forged effective town-gown relations. Along with Ann Levin and the vice-chancellor's wife Eileen Tanner, Rita's monthly "Discover UCSC" program invited women from the community for tea, a campus tour, and a lecture from a faculty member. She was instrumental in organizing an art auction fundraiser in her role with the UCSC Women's Club.

Rita graduated from Holy Names College, completed a teaching credential at UC Berkeley, and taught for a time. She began married life with Karl in 1950. While their six children were young, Rita's primary responsibilities were caring for her family and supporting her husband in his career. When her youngest child was a teenager, Rita became the principal of their Catholic parish high school. Rita's graciousness, generosity and commitment to education are reflected in the UC Santa Cruz Women's Club naming its scholarship endowment the Rita Olsen Pister Endowed Scholarship for Re-entry Students.

Rita touched many lives. Two of her dear friends are remembered through named scholarships that come from the Rita Olsen Pister Endowment. Robert Leet-Corday, a Santa Cruz businessman with an interest in art, honored Rita with a significant donation to the endowment upon his death. Frances Spodick Drake was a career woman, an author in the field of human resources and industrial psychology, a strong supporter of women and education, and a devoted member of the club. Rita passed away in 2011, but her spirit continues in the lives of those she inspired and the students who benefit from her generosity.

Proudly Presenting...Our 2011 Scholars!

Jesse Avila Jesse is an undergraduate with a double major in linguistics and psychology and a minor in education, planning ultimately to get a multiple-subject teaching credential. The married father of two small girls maintains an excellent academic record.

Katya Birken A psychology major, Katya has overcome a number of obstacles in her life, including a very difficult childhood. Her ultimate goal is to work with abused and at-risk children. She's currently involved with a student organization for former foster youth, runaways, orphans and those with similarly challenged backgrounds. Her scholarship will pay for summer fees at UCSC.

Eric Carter Eric is working toward a master's degree in education. His lifelong ambition has been to become a teacher. He wants to make a difference in the lives of his students and work to address patterns of injustice like those he has experienced. Eric's award will go toward his summer fees and expenses.

Judith Dorsey A single mom, Judie is studying psychology with the long-term goal of becoming a professor of psychology. Her scholarship award will help to pay for summer school, during which Judie will be in an academic internship program at an inpatient lock-down facility for patients with serious mental illness. This will integrate her coursework with community involvement. She receives our 4th annual Frances Spodick Drake Memorial Scholarship.

Fang Yu Hu A graduate student pursuing her PhD in modern East Asian history, Fang will use her award to fund her research this summer and fall and for an oral history workshop in August. Her research involves how and why Japanese colonial authorities focused on the schooling of children, and young girls in particular, to be the key to their success during the Japanese colonial period of 1895-1945. Through her studies, Fang will satisfy her intellectual curiosity and explore her identity as a Taiwanese-American woman.

Brent Hughes Brent is working toward a PhD in ecology and evolutionary biology, with a concentration in marine ecology. His scholarship will help lay the groundwork for his dissertation project, which will investigate the effects of pollution on ecosystems along the California coast. Brent is also a husband and father of a two-year old.

Farhad Ighani Suffering religious persecution, Farhad emigrated from Iran to the US where he felt he could make his dreams come true. He began to learn English and took a job at an optical shop in which his engineering skills began to shine. He decided to pursue a degree in bioengineering, and has worked in Jacob Rosen's lab developing a robotic arm for surgeries. His award will pay for his summer coursework and study.

Shirley Lavareda Shirley is majoring in Latin American and Latino Studies with a minor in education. She came from Brazil as an adult, learned English, and began her university education. Her academic interest involves the study of race and class relations among Latin Americans. Shirley's scholarship will fund her summer studies.

Aldinette Lockett Aldinette is an undergraduate sociology major who wants to become a college professor. A single woman raising two grandsons, she is returning to school to redefine her career path and is undaunted in her pursuit. Her scholarship will pay for summer fees at UCSC.

Angelica Lopez Angelica's experiences have led her to feel the need to incorporate more of the realities of people of color in academia. Angelica will use her scholarship to fund data collection for her PhD dissertation in developmental psychology focusing on the extent of helpfulness and collaboration among children of Mexican heritage.

Blaney McDonough Becoming pregnant with her son was a defining moment for Blaney, one that motivated her to finish college. She is pursuing a bachelor's degree in psychology and plans to continue to graduate school, preparing for a career in social or research psychology. Blaney's dedication, perseverance, and commitment fuel her belief that she can accomplish her goals.

Thong Nguyen Thong and his family were refugees to the U.S. after the Vietnam War, and he struggled to learn English as well as overcome a variety of challenges in this country. He is majoring in business management economics and accounting and will use the award to pay for air travel for a study-abroad program in China during the fall quarter. As a first generation college student, Thong views education as a vital tool for success in life and wants to be a role model for his three young nephews and younger cousin. Thong receives our first annual Robert Leet-Corday Memorial Scholarship.

Ann-Marie Osterback A PhD student in ecology and evolutionary biology, Ann-Marie earned her undergraduate degree in 2002 and began pursuing various career paths in ecology to gain perspective on the discipline. She settled on the field of aquatic ecology but realized that she needed an advanced degree to achieve the career growth she was seeking, which led her to UCSC. She does research on the impact of predators on threatened salmon populations. Ann-Marie's scholarship will fund the cost of analyzing her samples.

Lina Qaddoura With intentions to attend law school, Lina is currently pursuing legal studies. She is first in her family to attend college, coming from an Arab culture in which it is not typical for a woman to pursue higher education. She came to the U.S. with her family when she was small, and the *pro bono* assistance of an immigration lawyer allowed her family permanent residence. The lawyer's graciousness also motivated Lina to pay it forward. Her scholarship will cover summer session fees and books.



Angela Quiros Angela is a graduate student in the ecology and evolutionary biology program. Her scholarship will help to fund her research project in the Philippines that involves measuring the health of sea grass beds around the islands, which are home to an important food source foraged by women and children. Angela's goal is to return to the Philippines to teach and conduct research, to promote women in science, and to mentor them toward an academic track.

Joseph Sapp A graduate student in ecology and environmental biology, Joe's PhD focus is on social parasitism, investigating the behavioral ecology of slave-maker ants. Joe's goal at UCSC is to become better equipped to teach and study biology. His scholarship will be used toward analysis and shipping costs of sample preparation for his research.

Gretel Sinkola An undergraduate sociology major, Gretel is the first in her family to attend college. She is passionate about promoting social justice and is considering becoming a social worker. Gretel's scholarship will go toward her 2011-2012 academic year fees and expenses.

Diana Snyder After a challenging childhood, Diana is now an undergraduate student in astrophysics, one step closer to her dream of being an astronomer. As part of Sandy Faber's research team, she has been involved with analyzing Hubble Space Telescope images. Her award will help fund a trip to carry out observations at the Keck Telescopes atop Mauna Kea, and also to present her results at an upcoming meeting of the American Astronomical Society.

Eric Stanley Eric is a graduate student in the History of Consciousness Department. His research is on the intersection of trans/queer studies and prison studies. Eric's scholarship will allow him to do archival research at a library of specialized transgender documents in New York City. Upon completing his Ph.D., Eric hopes to join the staff of a community college with the goal of guiding others toward a university education.

Yuliana Vasquez Yuliana is a first-generation college student majoring in sociology. As a single parent, she works to support her son and her parents while still maintaining a 3.2 GPA. Her goal is to earn a master's degree in counseling so she can work with Latino youth who have experienced the same hardships and trials she did growing up. Her scholarship will fund summer session fees and books.

Louise Wells With a double major in neuroscience and biomolecular engineering, Louise is retraining for a new career path. Her goal is to contribute to society through work in the biotechnology field involving neuroscience and stem cells. Her scholarship will be used toward 2011-2012 academic year fees and expenses.

Tiffany Williams Tiffany experienced a difficult childhood as a foster youth and overcame an abusive relationship as an adult. Despite these challenges, she excelled in community college and transferred to UCSC. A married student with children, she plans to attend law school after completing her bachelor's degree in politics and hopes to work as a prosecutor in abuse cases. She will use her scholarship to pay for summer fees, books and childcare.

Lunch Bunch
