In January we drove past farm fields and approached Carmel Valley via the beautiful Laureles Grade. The destination was Garland Ranch on Carmel Valley Road. Most of the hikers climbed up a trail and looped

around back to the visitors center but a couple of us stayed on more level ground and discovered a nature center to explore. On the way home we stopped at an artichoke stand where purchases were made.

Almaden Quicksilver County Park in Santa Clara County was the next hike for the group. It was a lovely day and an interesting hike with some nice views out towards the valley and slopes of Mount Hamilton. Almaden Quicksilver occupies the site of the first mining enterprise in California and throughout the park you can find old mine buildings. A few steps up the trail there's an interpretive display with some old photos and a history of the mining operations.

The weather forecast did not promise good hiking weather announcing the possibility of showers for the March trek. However, the group had a glorious day, sunshine and very few clouds. It was chilly but hiking helps to take some of that chill away. The views were outstanding at the Long Ridge Open Space Preserve on Highway 35. We could see towards the ocean and Pescadero and the tree covered slopes of Big Basin. We felt we were on top of the world with very few signs of civilization to be seen. The hike went through open hilltops, to rambles next to a creek, to a pond situated at a turn for a monastery, to walks in the forest. We sat and gazed at the breathtaking view while eating our lunch on the Wallace Stegner memorial bench.

Alumni Association Honors Corinne Miller

n Saturday, February 4, the Alumni Association held its annual awards luncheon honoring individual faculty, staff, alums and a group of students. Established by the Alumni Association in 1995, the



Outstanding Staff Award is presented annually to a staff member to recognize sustained, distinguished service by staff to student life, the growth and improvement of UCSC's programs,

and the preservation of UCSC's unique intellectual and physical environment. UCSC Women's Club Past-President and UCSC Services for Transfer and Re-Entry Students (STARS) Director Corinne Miller won the Outstanding Staff Award. Under Corinne's leadership, STARS has grown from a small support program for re-entry women to one serving more than 3,000 transfer and re-entry students.

Recipients are nominated for the award, and Corinne received a number of compelling nominations from current and former staff, faculty, students, and members of friends groups including the Women's Club and Lifelong Learners. Ronaldo Ramirez, Director of Development in Student Affairs wrote, "As a testament to the quality of these programs, a greater proportion of transfer and re-entry students are elected to Phi Beta Kappa than from the general population." Yvonne Rodriguez, a STARS student and former Women's Club scholarship recipient, said of Corinne, "After you spend time with her, you really feel like there is nothing you can't do. Thank goodness she has an open-door policy so that you can stop in anytime you need support."

The luncheon was held at the College Nine and Ten Multipurpose Room, and a number of Women's Club members were present to celebrate Corinne's award. For the first time in its history the event was sold out, in no small part due to Corinne's friends and supporters!

EMILY CLARK "THROWS IN THE TROWEL"

One of the founding members of the club, Emily Clark, has retired from volunteer work at the UCSC Arboretum. Emily has been volunteering in various capacities for over 30 years there and has now taken a much deserved rest.
