

n October 23 the Adventure Group made the first trip of the season to visit Tao House, the home of playwright Eugene O'Neill, his wife Carlotta and their beloved Dalmatian Blemie. In 1937 they purchased a 158 acre ranch in Danville and built a house with a design based on the eastern Tao philosophy. Isolated from the world and within the walls of his home, O'Neill wrote his final and most memorable plays: The Iceman Cometh, Long Day's Journey into Night, and A Moon for the Misbegotten. To get to Tao House, a guide from the National Park Service picked us up in downtown Danville and drove us by shuttle bus up a hill, through a gated community, to a knoll with a beautiful view of the San Ramon Valley. After our tour of the house and garden, everyone agreed that it was a special experience and privilege to stand in O'Neill's study. It contains his original furniture, including his desk and typewriter. Due to the intervention of Katherine Hepburn, the park has also managed to retrieve his original bed, an antique Chinese opium bed. We found being in an author's living environment provided a new and unique perspective of his work.

We returned to Danville where we found a cute French deli and then headed down the road to Sunol where we paid homage to the Water Temple. It was designed in 1910 by architect Willis Polk, who always considered it his masterpiece. It was built for the Spring Valley Water Company to enhance it as a public utility service provider. In it, all the waters from the Alameda source of the Spring Valley Water Company meet and mingle before their long journey to San Francisco.

Our next Adventure group trip on November 14 was to the De Young Museum to see the Yves Saint Laurent Exhibit. Then across the concourse we went to the brand new California Academy of Sciences. To complete the day we dined at the Forbes Island Restaurant, a man-made floating island off Pier 39. The day was memorable for all.






Bonita Sebastian is the contact person for the Singles Gourmet group and the Drama Queens. They do not have regular meeting dates.

Three Charter Members

When the UCSC campus opened in 1965, professors and staff came to Santa Cruz from all over the country. With them came their spouses, little expecting that they would settle here permanently with their families and become contributing members to our community and the UCSC Women's Club.

Three of our current members who came to UCSC in the early 1960s were charter members when the Women's Club was founded on April 1, 1966. Each served as president. They are Emily Clark (1969-1970),Kay Wagstaff (1980-1981), and Evelyn Casolari (1972-1973 and 1982-1983). Emily, Kay, and Evelyn met with me and May Clark recently and shared memories about the Club's early history.

Encouraged by Kay Kerr from the UC Berkeley Campus to form a club to welcome newcomers to the UCSC campus, 41 members formed the UCSC Women's Club, open to wives of faculty and staff and women faculty and staff. The first meeting was held at Jane McHenry's home in Pasatiempo; Ann Thimann served as president, and Evelyn was treasurer. There were no dues; members met for tea and dessert at an annual meeting, and interest groups met frequently. One of the oldest groups is the Garden Club which Evelyn and Emily chaired. It dissolved twice, but thrives today. Another original group is Book Club One; at each meeting one member reviews a book for the group. Other groups included the Furniture Exchange where new faculty members and grad students could find needed household items, the Baby Sitting Co-Op, the Gourmet

Group and a Beach Walkers Group started by Kay. A popular outing was a holiday shopping and sightseeing trip to San Francisco.

In 1969 there were 101 members, and the Club had an outreach program to international students to help them become better acquainted with the community. By 1976 the Club provided a \$200 scholarship to one reentry student.

In 1977-1978, during the presidency of Jene Zenner, the Club's by-laws were changed to allow non-University, associate members to join the Club. Scholarship fundraisers continued. One December event held in the Cowell College Dining Hall was an "Evening in Vienna." It featured dessert, music provided by a 24-piece orchestra, and dancing. In 1983

the Women's Club began inviting the community to "Spring Garden Previews." Tickets were \$6.00 and eventually went up to \$10. In 1985 the Club began sponsoring juried art shows and auctions, exhibiting works by UCSC faculty, staff, and their spouses. A new fundraiser, "Boiling for Dollars," was introduced in 1987. Live lobsters for \$10 or cooked ones for \$11 could be ordered for pickup at the Barn Theater. The Club also published a cookbook that year.

Emily, Kay, and Evelyn acknowledged the strong support of many of the UCSC Chancellors' wives who have contributed greatly to the Women's Club, often hosting Club meetings at the campus University House. Artist Patsy Taylor, wife of the third UCSC Chancellor Angus Taylor, donated a painting to benefit the scholarship program. Karen Sinsheimer was a featured speaker at Club meetings.

Whatever the event, our three charter members have enjoyed the UCSC Women's Club and its many associations
