

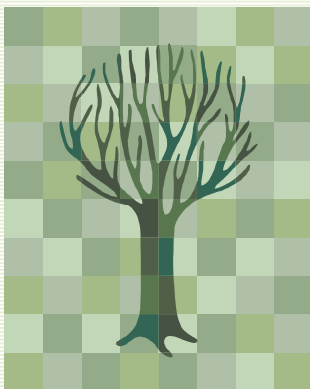
UCSC WOMEN'S CLUB: Where Campus and Community Come Together

The Bon Appetit group meets four times a year at dates that accommodate members of the group. Contact **Evelyn Prichard**.

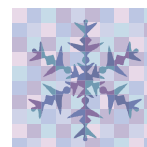
The Easy Riders Cycling Group meets, in different locations, at 11 a.m., alternating between Friday and Saturday. For date and location contact **Gloria Dyer**.

Volunteerism. . . it just might be the fountain of youth!

According to an online survey conducted among a national sample of 4,582 American adults, 86% of volunteers 65 and older feel younger than their age. The survey was conducted jointly by United HealthCare and Volunteer Match in March 2010.

Your volunteer work with the UCSC Women's Clubs helps to support both the club's activities and our re-entry scholarship program. Keep up the good work and stay young—it's that easy!

Note: *A change in dues was voted in at the October Fall Gathering. For July 2011, new rates will be \$40, regular membership, \$30 for seniors, and \$15 for students. This increase will help to stabilize our scholarship fund while still covering the new 6% fee imposed by the university on all monies collected by the club.*

In Memoriam: Kathryn Wagstaff 1918 – 2010

A founding member of the UCSC Women's Club, Kay Wagstaff was active in campus and community affairs. A native San Franciscan and a 1940 graduate of UC Berkeley, she came to Santa Cruz in 1963. Emily Clark, a fellow founding member of the Women's Club, shared a story that Kay often told about her first impressions of Santa Cruz. "When Kay's husband Jack was hired as UCSC campus architect, Kay stayed behind in Marin County so one of her sons could complete his final year of high school. During one of Kay's visits to Santa Cruz, Jack drove her around and showed her downtown. (This was in the days before the university students arrived and before the Pacific Garden Mall.) Upon seeing the area, Kay asked if this was it for Santa Cruz, and being told it was, she responded, 'Well, whoop-di-doo!' She was not impressed but must have learned to appreciate the city because she continued to live here for many, many years."

Kay was director of the La Fonda Children's Center from 1967 – 1977 and in 1970 earned a certificate in early childhood education from Cabrillo College. At UCSC she was also instrumental in founding the UC Santa Cruz Arboretum and Garden Club and served as UCSC Women's Club President from 1980-81. Club member Irene Osterbrock recently recalled, "Kay loved to tell, with fond remembrance, about the early days of our campus. With her considerable energy, she participated in several of the Friends organizations at UCSC. She was also a valuable link to the life of the rest of Santa Cruz. She was a founder of the Art Museum of Santa Cruz County, now part of the Museum of Art and History. She set a fine example in so many ways, and I am very grateful I became one of her many friends."

Interest Group Update

Interest groups continue to be an important component of UCSC Women's Club activities. At the October meeting, a number of people enthusiastically signed up as potential new members of the Garden Club, the Adventure Club, and the Play Reading Group. English in Action has been revitalized by undertaking a joint venture with members of Lifelong Learners. In addition to meeting with their students, volunteers now have monthly meetings with each other to discuss their experiences and exchange tips on interacting with the students.

Many people have expressed an interest in belonging to a book club. Because the current ones are full, we need NEW BOOK CLUBS. We have successfully launched one new group, Book Club 5. Book choices will be eclectic - including fiction, non-fiction, mysteries, biographies - whatever members want. Meetings are in members' homes from 1 to 2:30 pm on the first Monday of each month. Launching the second suggested book club, for those who love fiction (or non-) about art, travel and gardens, is proving more challenging primarily because of scheduling. Other members need or want an evening group or a club that meets nearer Corralitos. Think hard, one of these book clubs may be just right for you!

An organizational meeting for a knitting/crochet group is in the planning stage. Members have also inquired about the possibility of a group to study beginning French or Spanish conversation or, alternatively, advanced Spanish conversation or book discussion. Are you interested? What about cooking? Jewelry making? Genealogy? iSanctuary

The UCSC Women's Club was recently honored to have Dorene Dawson as its November membership luncheon speaker. In her position as Santa Cruz Regional Coordinator for **International Sanctuary** (iSanctuary), Dorene is pivotal in getting the word out on her group's mission, which is to rehabilitate girls rescued from sexual slavery, get them into safe houses and schools, provide them with marketable training, and empower them with the skills they need to sustain themselves and to pursue futures filled with hope.

One very effective way they are achieving these goals is through making jewelry which is sold throughout the US. The act of coming together with other victims and creating something not only lovely but saleable offers these girls dignity and hope. Their motto is "Purchase with Purpose." Locally, iSanctuary's jewelry is available at Norrie's Gift Shop at UCSC's Arboretum. (See story on Norrie's elsewhere in this issue.)

Human trafficking is a \$32B business worldwide. It is defined as the transportation and sale of human beings, often for purposes of exploitation. Mumbai, India, is Asia's largest sex industry center with more than 100,000 sexually-exploited people. Girls as young as five are known to have been trafficked and sold into child prostitution for as little as \$100. Authorities estimate that more than one million people are trafficked every year, adding to the figure of 27 million people around the world presently living in slavery. 80% of trafficking victims are women and children. Victims of sex trafficking are most commonly sold by their families, or forced, deceived, or abducted, then transported and sold into slavery. Sex trafficking is the second largest source of profits for international organized crime, behind drugs. To bring it closer to home, of those same one million people, anywhere from 14-17,500 individuals are trafficked into the United States each year. Even closer to your home: the FBI has designated California as the state with the highest number of children being sold for sex. The average age of a child sold for sex in the US is 14.

iSanctuary founders Stephanie Pollaro and Wendy Hicks took a church-sponsored trip to India following the deadly tsunami of 2004. Both women were struck by the needs of so many people struggling amid staggering poverty. Stephanie told Wendy about her dream to move to India and work with girls rescued from the red light district.

Pollaro now lives in Mumbai, India, and works with the girls daily, teaching them the art of jewelry making, English and life skills. She is lovingly called Didi, which means "sister." Hicks coordinates iSanctuary programs, sales, education, fundraisers and all stateside business from Irvine, CA. Many people told the pair the problems were insurmountable, but Stephanie and Wendy still felt something should and could be done. Dorene adds, "If the life of only one girl is saved through this program, then all of this work will be worth it."
